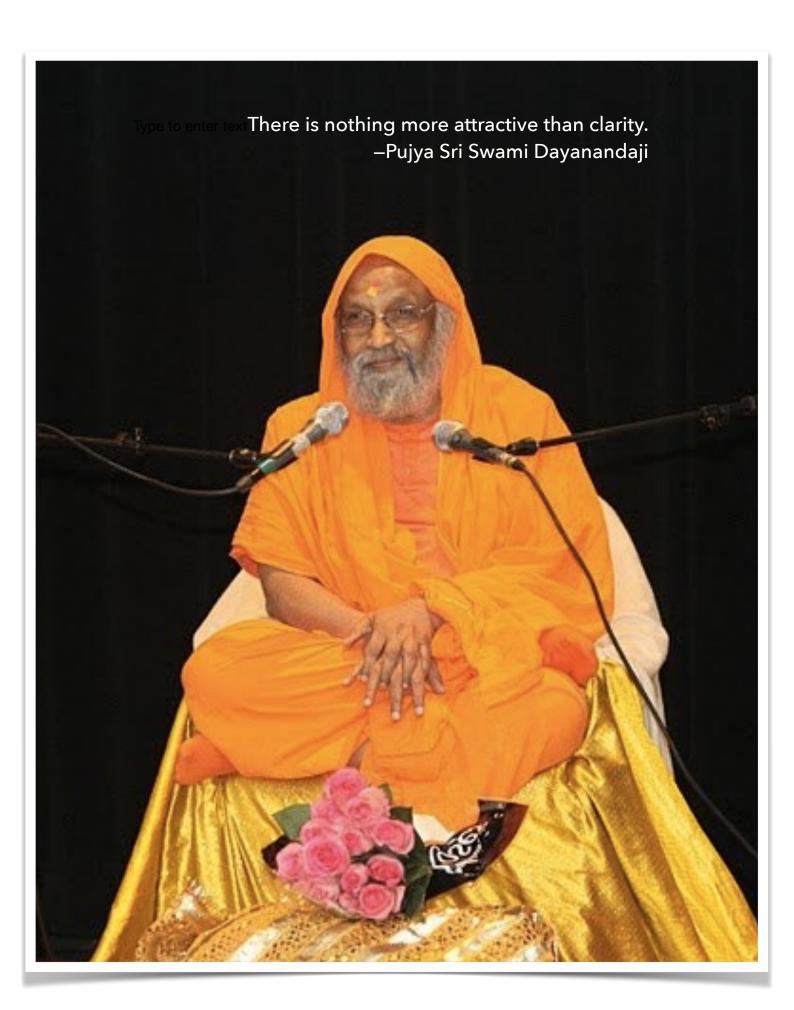

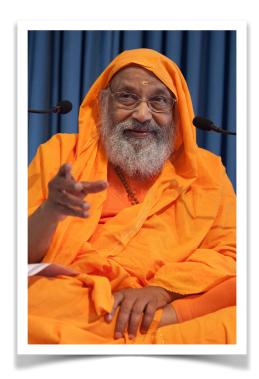

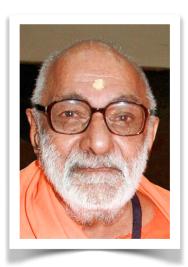


The Visionary

ASHRAM LIFE

Based on ancient Vedic knowledge, the ashram lifestyle is designed solely for the cultivation of emotional maturity, an essential prerequisite for gaining self-knowledge. Generally, one's life is crowded by numerous distractions, dead-end pursuits, and mindless consumption. By contrast, the ashram lifestyle is uncomplicated and devoid of the need to keep making choices. Not needing to make decisions about what to wear or eat gives the spiritual aspirant a much-needed respite from constantly being at the mercy of well-entrenched preferences and prejudices, and instead allows one to focus on assimilating the truth of oneself as limitlessly whole and free. When one is committed to self-knowledge, needless preoccupations and distractions effortlessly drop away, allowing one the opportunity to reset one's priorities in life.

We encourage you to participate in all aspects of the course wholeheartedly. This knowledge, and lifestyle that accompanies it, is transformative and brings the gifts of equanimity and contentment.



ARRIVAL, ROOMS, & MEALS

Please report to the office/reception soon upon your arrival to receive keys and directions to your room. All rooms are fully furnished and equipped with cot, mattress, bedsheet and pillowcase, chair, table, lights, fan, geyser for bath, water jug, and cleaning materials. Therefore, there is no need to bring these items. Bring only items that you need for your comfort, bearing in mind the weather during the course, which will include, summer, monsoon, and a light winter. Please conserve electricity by switching off appliances when not in use. The ashram serves a simple sattvic diet (devoid of onion and garlic), which includes, rice, roti, dal, khichadi, kadi, and seasonal vegetables. There will be three meals a day, plus tea served in the early morning, mid-morning, and afternoon. Everyone is expected to do gurukula-seva for roughly an hour a day during the course of their stay at the ashram.



ASHRAM DRESS CODE

The dress code for the six month course students will be white dhotishirt or pyjama-kurta for men and white saree or salwar kameez for women. The dress code will set the course students apart from other campers and casual visitors to the ashram, thereby underscoring the seriousness of one's commitment, and contributing to emotional growth and maturity. In a way, it is nice not to be preoccupied with what to wear each day, thereby allowing one to cultivate a tranquil and focussed mindset. Additionally, kindly ensure that you are fully clothed at all times while in the public areas. Please abstain from wearing shorts and sleeveless and/or revealing attire.

CLASSROOM ETIQUETTE & DECORUM

Classes and satsangs will be conducted in the Yoga Hall next to the temple. There will be floor seating with personal desks. You can bring your own asanas or seat-cushions as needed. For people who are unable to sit on the floor, a few chairs are available.

All classes will begin promptly at the times indicated. In the Vedic tradition, it is considered respectful on the students' part to assemble in the classroom before the arrival of the acharyas. This habit cultivates an eagerness to learn, and allows one the space to compose the mind to receive the sacred transmission of self-knowledge. Further, this practice avoids needless distractions that can be created by late-comers scrambling to occupy their spots in the room at the last minute or after the class has begun. For these reasons, please plan to arrive early, and be seated at least five minutes before the beginning of each class. Eating, drinking, or chewing gum is never allowed in the classroom. Please finish your snacks/ tea before entering the hall.

The classroom will be cleaned twice a week. Please cooperate by removing your personal effects from the room and by stacking your desks to one corner on cleaning days (Tuesdays and Fridays).

SRI GANGADHARESWARA TEMPLE

Beautiful and serene, Gangadhareshwara temple is an abode of joy and peace. If one is serious about seeking freedom from saṃsāra— a life assailed by constant wants—cultivating devotion is a must. The primary way to protect the desire for self-knowledge from being hijacked by other desires or overpowered by obstacles is through prayer. A consecrated temple, where daily pujas are held becomes a powerful center for neutralising even the most difficult of karmas, thereby allowing one to be steadfast in one's pursuit.



THE SAMADHI MANDIR

The adhiṣṭhāna of Parama Pujya Sri Swami Dayanandaji is the embodiment of guru-anugraha, the grace, of the Guru. The *śāstra* mentions several kinds of anugraha needed to assimilate the teachings of the self as non-separate from *Īśvara,* the Lord. Of these, the Guru's grace is of paramount importance. We worship the Guru's abode to seek the blessings of emotional maturity and the gift of growing clarity in the assimilation of the vidyā. We also pray for all obstacles in the pursuit of self-knowledge to be burnt to ashes. Ever the embodiment of compassion, Pujya Swamiji never denies granting anyone's sincere and heartfelt desires. We pray to the Guru for the wellbeing of all students and for the success of the course.



GURUKULA-SEVA

"Sevā" is a Sanskrit word that can be loosely translated as service. Reaching out to help others allows the heart to bloom and grow in compassion. The seva offered to the ashram and the guru assists in one's self growth and emotional maturity. Students will be assigned to a seva roster that rotates fortnightly. Since the whole idea of seva is to gladly accept and perform the task assigned, there will not be much room for choosing the seva, except under extenuating circumstances, such as illness, physical infirmity, .

These are the seva opportunities at the ashram:

- -Breakfast, lunch, and dinner service (Daily)
- -Mala-making for temple deities (Daily)
- -Assisting with puja at the adhishthanam (Daily)
- -Classroom cleaning (Tuesdays and Fridays)
- -Temple and Samadhi-Mandir Cleaning (Tues-Thurs-Sat)
- -Photo Gallery cleaning (Mondays and Thursdays)
- -Flower and Mala purchase coordinating (Daily)
- -Yoga Hall Deep Cleaning (Once a Month)



FESTIVALS

The Vedic tradition is one where vision of non-duality pervades all aspects of the everyday life. The festivals that we celebrate are no exception. We will participate in many important festivals together throughout the course, such as Mahasivaratri, International Yoga Day, Guru Purnima, Krishna-janmashtami, Ganesha Chaturthi, Onam, Navaratri, and Dipavali to name a few. The festivals are an effortless way of relating to *Īśvara*, the Lord. Immersing oneself in the richness of the Vedic culture affords a wonderful opportunity for understanding their significance in one's life in general, and for one's spiritual growth in particular.

Additionally, there will be Ganga-Arati and Sadhu-Bhandaras being offered throughout. The Ganga-Arati teaches us about the respect accorded to ecology in the tradition, while the Sadhu-Bhandara offers practical instruction about the richness of the monastic tradition in the vaidika-dharma. Even for those raised in the Hindu culture, the festivals celebrated at the ashram afford a renewed opportunity to examine all that one may have taken for granted and to reconnect with the profundity of one's customs and culture.



MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION

COURSE TEXTBOOKS AND CLOTHES

Books can be bought at the Gita Press near Ram Jhula, which is a short walk from the ashram. In the same area, you can also find white clothes for purchase. Sanskrit books will be available at the bookstore located across the office.

YOGA CLASSES

Yoga classes will take place between 5:15 and 6:00 pm daily (except during the days off and as advised) in the Yoga Hall, located upstairs next to the main temple.

DRINKING WATER

You can fill up your jugs and bottles at the Drinking Water Station right next to the office.

BED LINENS

You can exchange your bed linens once every two weeks on your days off from Housekeeping and Stores, located near the side entrance of the Dining Hall. Please contact Sri Mukesh, who is in charge of Housekeeping.

SUNDRY ITEMS

Personal items, such as snacks, soap, toiletries, etc., are available in small shops outside the main ashram gate.

GENERAL ASHRAM RULES AND REGULATIONS

Swami Dayananda Ashram welcomes you to a comfortable and peaceful stay. This ashram is meant only for the stay of those who are connected and committed to Arsha Vidya teachings. Please make sure that you register yourself by submitting a copy of your Aadhar/Passport/Visa on your arrival. We request you to kindly pay attention to the following rules during your stay and strictly follow them:

- The daily routine of the ashram is displayed on the notice board.
 Please follow the general timings of temple prayers, dining and closure of ashram gates and so on.
- Please attend all the programs in the ashram during your stay.
- Please switch off the light, fan, geyser, etc. when you are not in the room.
- Please take food in the dining hall only, and do not bring the food to the rooms.
- Please do not collect kitchen utensils in the room.
- Cooking in the room is prohibited. Onion and garlic are strictly not permitted in the ashram.
- Please note that one begins to eat only after the prayer chanting (Gita Chapter 15) is completed.
- Smoking, liquor consumption, and doing any kind of drugs are strictly prohibited. Violations of this policy will entail in immediate eviction.
- Guests are requested to maintain decent attire while staying in the ashram and avoid using shorts, sleeveless etc. that will expose the body. The permitted dress code is pyjama/kurta, full pant/shirt or dhoti/ angavastra or shirt for males and sari/blouse or salwar/kameez for females.

- Students should refrain from making loud noises such as playing music loudly, singing and dancing in the rooms or in the premises that will disturb the other sadhakas in the ashram. Kindly maintain silence during your stay in the ashram, particularly near the temple, Samadhi Mandir and Dining Hall.
- Please do not take bath in Ganga away from the bank. The water is deep in some areas near the bank. Please do not take valuables when you go to take bath as they can be swept away.
- Please do not directly hire any staff for services in your room or for yourself or pay any money without the consent of the administration.
- The Ashram is run on voluntary donations. Students are requested to make Rs 5000 monthly donations to the ashram every month. Donations up to Rs 10000 can be made in cash but IT exemption is not available and one should take printed receipt compulsorily for all donations. PAN Number has to be given for all donations. Donors are discouraged from making cash donations. For different schemes of donations please contact the office or visit our website www.dayananda.org. Office timings are 8.00 to 12.30 noon and 3.00 to 7.00 p.m.
- Please drop off the room keys at the security if you are leaving at odd hours. Otherwise please hand over the keys at the office at the time of departure.
- People who do not follow the rules will be disbarred from staying at the ashram in the future. Hence please make sure that you follow all the rules mentioned above. Thank you and have a pleasant stay.
- It is strictly prohibited to eat in the dining facilities of adjacent ashrams without the written permission of the Acharya. Violation of this rule can result in disbarment.
- It is forbidden to visit the rooms of the opposite sex or socialize with other students or guests.

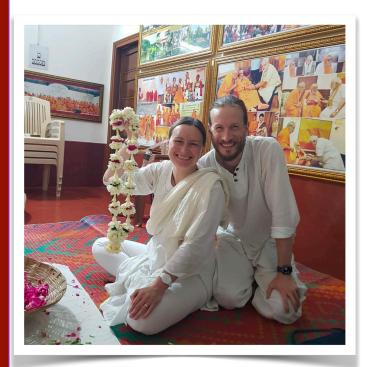
